Notes from the President's Desk.....

I trust that everyone had a most enjoyable Thanksgiving holiday and that you all are looking forward to the coming Christmas festivities. This is the time of year when we start making plans and resolutions for the new year ahead, but it is also a good time to look back and reflect on the year about to end. In going back over the NMGMS activities of 2011, we see that as a rock and mineral organization, we have a lot of accomplishments to be proud of. Our meetings had some dynamite programs and were well attended; we had many fantastic field trips and several beading/lapidary workshops. Two NMGMS members earned federation (SFMS) scholarships to attend the William Holland Lapidary School, one thru the stamp program and the other thru the junior rockhound scholarship program. We also awarded one NMGMS sponsored scholarship to a club member for a William Holland class. In all, NMGMS had seven club members attend this fantastic lapidary school this year.

NMGMS was asked by two of the local area Art Councils to share its expertise and teach a Beginning Beading class. Our beading enthusiast members stepped up to the plate and volunteered to teach and help out, so we had two very successful classes, one in May and

the other this past October. The club's 2010 yearbook which was submitted to the

American Federation of Mineralogical Societies' competition in July took a gold medal,

thus showing that NMGMS is an "All American Club"!

Our organization saw a dramatic increase in membership this year, with many new junior members added to our roster. So this past spring, NMGMS added a Youth Members committee and applied to the American Federation to start up a Future Rockhounds of America group within the club. Now our junior members can earn badges thru the FRA program, as they work on a variety of activities in the rock, mineral, gem, fossil and lapidary fields. This fall, one of our NMGMS junior members took second place in the

SFMS Junior of the Year (JOY) competition and one other achieved "recognition of

participation".

In 2011, we established our very own club domain on the Internet and now have an up

and running website (<u>www.nmgms.org</u>) which has helped tremendously with our club's publicity. Financially, despite all of the outlays for club programs, supplies, scholarships, memorials and other club necessaries, we still managed to end the year with about the same amount in the club checking account as last year!

So, all in all, it looks like the North Mississippi Gem and Mineral Society had a very good year and hopefully, 2012 will continue to show that our club is a growing, active, vital, interesting, fun and educational rock and mineral society. In order to be the very

Our group had planned to do some collecting at the Union Chapel Mine and to then proceed to a second site in the afternoon. So after doing a few hours of breaking open shale slabs and hunting for those elusive trackways, we packed up and as a caravan of cars, headed toward our second site of the day.

Ashley Allen was hoping to lead us to a gas station for a much needed rest stop, when we ended up in one of the areas of Alabama where a tornado had gone thru on that fateful spring night when over 100 tornadoes ripped thru the Midsouth region. Luckily for us, there was one of those vigilant patrol cars on the corner, so lo and behold, after making inquires as to how to proceed around the barricades, we were given a police escort to the only available "public" restroom in town... the temporary police headquarters trailer! We all hated to see the day end, but with it getting dark so much earlier and the long trip home ahead of us, we hauled all of our

COLD CONNECTIONS A HOT TICKET AT WILLIAM HOLLAND

As soon as the new listing of classes came out last November, I was on the phone with my William Holland partner in crime and fellow NMGMS member Beth Parker, to select the dates and classes we both wanted to take in 2011. We are both wanna-be silversmiths, so the Silver I and II classes were tops on our lists. I. however, had a burning desire to take a Cold Connections class with Kim St. Jean, my idol. In my heart, I'm more a pounder of metal, a stamper, an etcher and a mixed metal lover than a pure silversmither. Turns out, all of Kim's classes book immediately. I had to wait until her final class in October for my stamping and etching spree. I'm here to tell you, that it was well worth that wait. For those of you who don't know, a cold connection joins two or more metals without using solders or glues. If you have any desire to venture into the realm of riveting, lashing, piercing, formfolding and generally going multi-metal crazy, book your trip into Cold Connections with Kim St. Jean as tour quide. Sunday evening after our 6+ hour drive, we had dinner and trotted off to our classes. I found myself in a room at the end of the hall, cheek by jowl with seven other eager St. Jean fans. Of course we all came with her book, "Mixed Metal Mania." Kim is funny, warm, inventive and has an extremely well structured class. She explains things clearly; she doesn't do

information overload, but instead provides direction as you move through each production step.

If you like rock music, her iPod plays Queen and Creedence Clearwater Revival, The Who and Springsteen, Bob Seger, the Stones, the Beatles and Elton John—if you were alive and dancing in the 70s, 80s, 90s, Kim's got you covered. Never have I had more fun in a class of eight simpatico women, aged 20-something to well over 70. We hammered, we learned to color metal with our torches, we formfolded, we "exploded" pendants, we laced works together and we sang: "Fat Bottomed Women", "Bad Moon Rising," "Won't Get Fooled Again" and "Rocket Man." Even Silver Smith II teacher Dan Haga came over and sang along. Dan and Kim had a studio together in Charlotte for years until Kim's recent move to Myrtle Beach.

While we sang our hearts out, we also worked our fingers off. I came home with a number of completed pieces and even more half-works. I laughed more than I have in any other class I've taken and I came home inspired.

If you think you might be interested in a Cold Connection class, get a copy of Kim's book. Just like her class, the book is clearly written, taking you from the basics to

more complicated work as you move through. I'm now using a number of cold connections in my silver work and chain making. Kim St. Jean has a second book coming out after the first of the year. You can find either of her works at www.KalmbachBooks.com.
