
Bead Soup: A Place to Talk "Shop"! By Nancy Roberts



The idea for the beaded wire Christmas decoration that we did at our last club meeting came from NMGMS member Bernice Burkeen. She said to make the frames like Christmas shapes, use cookie cutters! What a great idea, and it worked out well.

Here is how to make the frames:

Using 2 feet of 16, 18, or 20 gauge craft wire, make a wrapped loop on one end of the wire. Place the wrapped







Using the cookie cutter as a mandrel, work the wire around the shape with your fingers, taping to secure as you go, if needed. Use chain nose pliers to make any sharp bends. (I used copper coated craft wire, so was able to make all bends by hand).

Continue to work the wire around; when you get back to the top, wrap the tail wire

around the loop below your first wraps once or twice, then remove your wire shape from the cookie cutter. Wrap the tail wire around several more times and trim off the excess wire. Work-harden





(stiffen) the shape by hammering it on a bench block with a nylon or rawhide hammer. All Bead Soup photos by Nancy Roberts

This was the first jewelry workshop that Hunter and I participated in, and we are hooked! We had a great time learning how to work with metal and all of the different steps required. Nancy and the other instructors were so patient, helpful, and supportive.....even when my designs became "organic shapes", LOL. It was a relaxed and enjoyable day. Hunter and I are looking forward to another workshop to learn more metal working techniques.

Jonas and I loved the bangle class; it was easy, and we were able to hone ours skills such as annealing, soldering, and hammering. Submitted by Leslie Lane

This was the first workshop where we worked with silver wire solder and flux. We quickly learned that the key to a successful solder join is a tight fit and keeping your eye on the



flux and solder. We had fun working with heavy gauges of copper wire; annealing, forging, and shaping the wire to make a "wave" bangle. Hammering the ends of the wire to make nice "paddles" was a technique that we practiced. For our

second bangle, we flattened the wire in several places and then produced a twisted wire by using a portable drill and Vise grips. Amazing how just the flat areas twist while

the rest of the wire remains round! We soldered the ends of the twisted wire together to make a bangle bracelet. After

making three of these twisted wire bangles, we were becoming much more adept at the soldering process. Everyone went home with at least 5 bangles. Great fun and good experience for all! Submitted by Nancy Roberts

Alabama Marble by Chris Rutherford

Greetings Fellow Rockhounds, I recently took a trip to north Alabama and camped at the Guntersville State Park. As a geologist, I never mind taking the scenic route when time permits it because I get to experience the sights and wonders that our state has to offer. On my way home from Guntersville, we stopped in Sylacauga at the huge marble quarry pit. If you have never seen it, I fully recommend it. Alabama is home to the whitest marble in the world. The marble vein that runs through Sylacauga runs nearly 32 miles long and is approximately 600' thick. The earliest recorded history of the Talladega marble belt was during General Andrew Jackson's expeditionary force against the Creek Indians in 1814. Commercial mining did not start until 1834. Alabama marble has been mined continuously since then and is displayed in museums, buildings, and monuments across the world. However, most marble mining today is for industrial

uses, such as filler in PVC pipe, and not structural uses, such as building clad or statues. Note from Chris Rutherford, "I have been fascinated with the marble quarries in Sylacauga after I read a history of Andrew Jackson's campaign against the Creek Indians in the War of 1812. Members of his Officer's Corp noted all the fine marble deposits in the area and earmarked the land for themselves after the war."

TROUBLING COURT RULING by MATTHEW LYBANON, MAGS EDITOR

A recent court decision (only applies to Montana but could spread to other states) reclassified fossils as minerals that now fall under the purview of Mineral Rights, taking their legal ownership from the land or property owner and placing them under the domain of the property's mineral rights holder. This split decision changes the long-held legal opinion that allowed ranchers and other property holders the right to allow fossil collecting on their property. This ruling applies to all fossils: vertebrates, invertebrates, and plants.

The drastic change in established law now puts academic and commercial paleontologists, as well as the casual fossil collector and museum collections, in great peril. If you don't have the permission of the owner of the mineral rights, you cannot take any fossils from privately owned land even if you have the land owner's permission. Even more importantly, if you have fossils from Montana in your possession, you may lose those fossils to the owners of the mineral rights.

The 9th Circuit has granted a 30-day extension of time for attorneys to file a petition for rehearing and for the Association of Applied Paleontological Sciences (AAPS) to submit an Amicus Brief. The AAPS created a Go Fund Me page to raise funds to have an attorney produce and file an Amicus Brief, the goal being to ask the court for an *en banc* hearing by a larger panel of judges and get this decision overturned. The goal is to raise \$70,000 for lawyer and court fees. The extension is only until December 19, so anyone wishing to contribute should not wait long.

The AAPS is a public charity under IRS section 501(c)(3). As such, it is tax exempt for income tax purposes and is permitted to receive tax deductible gifts pursuant to the Internal Revenue Service. Donations to this Go-Fund Me page are totally tax deductible here in the United States. 100% of all donations will be used for the purposes stated. Donation letters will be provided for tax purposes on request.
