NMGMS Field Trip: January 6, 2024, Trip to Alabama

The January NMGMS field trip will be on **Saturday, January 6, 2024,** to collect Mississippian fossils from the Bangor Formation. We will be collecting fossils such as bryozoans, blastoids, brachiopods, and corals.

We will meet at the gas station/convenience store in Belgreen, AL on the corner of Hwy 24 and 187, approximately 17 miles east of Red Bay, AL at 9:30 a.m.

Bring small containers, cardboard flats, and a bucket for carrying your fossils and gear. Newspapers, paper towels, or aluminum foil are recommended for wrapping up those that are fragile. A rock hammer, chisel, and something to pry with are also handy to have. Wear boots or shoes that can get wet or muddy, and bring a hat, water, sunscreen, safety glasses, etc. A backpack or extra bucket is good to have, since we will be walking and carrying our gear with us.

If you like working with metals, but either don't have a torch for soldering or are a bit leery of using one, then cold connections using rivets is a must for you. Come join NMGMS on **Saturday, January 27, 2024, 10 a.m. upstairs at the Link Centre** in Tupelo for a fun and "riveting" workshop. You will make a pendant in this class while learning to use a variety of rivets in your mixed metals creations. You will be riveting several components on the pendant such as a dapped circle and a charm of your choice. You will also be able to try out several methods of adding texture and patina to your piece. You will make a clasp and finish the ends of a piece of leather so you will be able to wear the pendant.

Workshop fee is \$20 and includes all materials and the use of the tools. Class is limited to 10, so sign up soon. Learning to rivet several pieces of metal together is a great skill to have in your "toolbox", and it opens a whole spectrum of design possibilities. Bring a brown bag lunch. There is a refrigerator available.

Our NMGMS lapidary room #136 at the Link Centre in Tupelo will be open on Saturday, January 27, 2024, at 10 a.m. for those members interested. There are two large slab saws and a 10 inch saw available, as well as a trim saw and two cab machines. Bring some stones that you would like to slab. We have a box of slabs that you can "play" with, if you don't have any of your own.

The cabochon machines are available for those members certified to use them. Jim Roberts and/or Paul Gunther will be on hand to help with the saws and to get members

certified to use the equipment. The room is small, so workshop is limited to 6-8 members at any one time.

Lapidary fee: \$1 per cut with the slab saws, \$2 an hour on the cab machine and trim saw.

Grab Bags: If you sew, we need more bags!

Our NMGMS stockpile of grab bags is getting down, and we still have plenty of rocks and fossils to fill more. We need members to volunteer to put together more of the cloth bags. This would be a good winter project for when it's too cold for other club activities. The construction is not difficult, so if you can sew, please look at the cloth bag shown below.



Instructions: Cut an 8x15 inch piece of fabric. Notice how it's sewn. You'll sew the casing for the draw string first and then do the side and bottom seams. Make seams half an inch, so the finished bag is approximately 7x7 inches. Experiment, they don't all have to be exactly the same size or configuration, just colorful and enticing! I sew a ¾ inch turn along the long edge for the yarn first (with the yarn already in place). Fold the fabric in half with right sides together, then sew the bottom & up the one side, stopping before the yarn tube. Good luck and thanks!

"A Successful NMGMS Fossil Road Show and Geology Fest" by Nancy Roberts

The North Mississippi Gem and Mineral Society, in conjunction with the Oren Dunn City Museum in Tupelo, hosted its ninth annual Fossil Road Show on Friday, November 3 and Saturday, November 4, 2023. This year on Friday, November 3rd, our featured speaker was George Phillips, paleontologist with the Mississippi Museum of Natural Science in Jackson, MS.

The topic for Mr. Phillip's presentation was the K-Pg Boundary, previously known as the K-T Boundary. This boundary is represented by a thin layer of rock which marks the end of the Mesozoic Era and the beginning of the Cenozoic Era, 66 million years ago. This boundary is associated with the mass

extinction event that wiped out 75% of plant and animal species including all non-avian dinosaurs.

Mr. Phillips presented an overview of some of the geologic features of Mississippi and how they were formed. He showed how you could tell on the geologic map of the state exactly where the K-Pg boundary is located. He talked about exposures of this boundary within the state of Mississippi, what it is composed of, and how it relates to the Chicxulub asteroid strike off the Yucatan Peninsula which occurred 66 million years ago.

This presentation was a wealth of information. I think the topic was new to many. Most of us know that the dinosaurs disappeared, but many did not know that there was evidence of this event right here in Mississippi!



I have volunteered at two Geology Fests in a row



November Meeting Review: "What Can That Shark's Tooth Tell

Our guest speaker for the November 18, 2023, NMGMS meeting was Chase Egli, a graduate student from the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa. Chase's program covered the more common shark teeth that we collect on

our field trips in Mississippi and Alabama. His presentation not only talked about the genus and species identification of those teeth, but he also covered many characteristics that would tell us where in the

shark's jaw a particular tooth would be located. This was new information to many of us. We learned that the size and shape of the tooth could tell you whether it was an upper tooth, or one found in the lower jaw and how close to the front or back of the mouth it occurred. He also explained how you could tell which side of the tooth faced inward. He explained terms like labial, lingual, and anterior, etc. Chase also showed some of the specific features found on a tooth



that would pin down the species. Wow, I will certainly look more closely at my specimens from now on! Chase brought a variety of teeth to show us. Of course, the Megalodon tooth was the star!






Rockheads' Officers for 2024

"The Florissant Fossil Beds" by Amelia Thornton

Did you know that long ago Colorado was home to giant redwood trees? For most people, the west coast of the United States comes to mind when thinking about redwood trees. This past October I traveled to Colorado to visit the Florissant Fossil Bed National Monument located in Florissant, Colorado.

At the museum I learned that Colorado was once a warm temperate forest during the Eocene Epoch. Unfortunately, the eruption of a super volcano many miles away wiped out the redwoods. The volcano formed massive mudflows of ash and water called lahars. The mudflows covered the redwoods and eventually petrified the stumps, some of which are still visible in the park today. The mudflows dammed up a stream which led to the formation of

ancient Lake Florissant. Over time, thin layers of shale formed on the bottom of the lake. Dead bugs, fish, plants, birds, and bats were preserved and fossilized at the bottom of the lake. As time went on, the landscape changed, and the lake disappeared.

Eventually people settled in Florissant and found the redwood stumps and fossils in the shale layers. People even tried to take one of the redwood stumps to the World's Fair. Unfortunately, they did not succeed; the saw blades are still stuck in the petrified stump! In the museum there are many fascinating fossils that have been found in the park. If you are ever in Florissant, you should stop by and check out the museum and hiking trails to see an interesting piece of history.

December is the month for the Geminid Meteor Shower. It will last up until Christmas. These meteors last longer and burn brighter than most, making them a rival to the famous Perseids of August. You may be able to see up to 50 or more an hour on a dark clear night away from city lights.

The peak of this shower will fall on December 13-14th, so watch the sky from 9 p.m. into the wee hours.

This meteor shower is called the Geminids because the meteors appear to radiate out from Castor, the bright star in the constellation of Gemini. Gemini (The Twins) will rise in the east around 9 p.m. Lay back and look in all directions as the meteors shoot across the sky. Grab a blanket, lean back, and enjoy! Look up for a change instead of at the ground. These meteors burning in the sky are actually space rocks left by the asteroid 3200 Phaethon!
